ADMISSIONS PROCESS FOR SPECIALIZED TESTING HIGH SCHOOLS*

- Acceptance to one of the eight Specialized Testing High School was based on three factors, in this order:
 - a. The student's score on the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test (SHSAT)
 - b. The priority order in which the student listed the Specialized Testing High Schools on the SHSAT answer sheet on the day of the test
 - c. Seat availability
- At the time of the test, students listed the Specialized Testing High Schools they
 were interested in attending, in priority order on the answer sheet. Prior to the test,
 students discussed their choices with their parents and listed these choices on the
 Test Ticket, which was signed by both student and parent.
- 3. In collaboration with the Department of Education, each of the eight Specialized Testing High Schools determined the number of seats that could be offered to 9th and 10th grade students for the 2016-2017 school year. This number accounted for students likely to decline the offer, based on each school's admissions history.
- 4. Tests were scored by an independent company.
- 5. All test-takers were ranked according to their scores from the highest score to the lowest score.
- The student with the highest score was offered a seat in his/her first choice (or, highest prioritized school).
- 7. Going down the list from the highest score, each student, in turn, was offered a seat in their highest prioritized school that still had available seats. For example, if all the seats in a student's first choice had been given to students who scored higher, s/he was offered a seat in her/his second choice (if there were seats still available). If all the seats in her/his second choice had been given to students who scored higher, s/he was offered a seat in her/his third choice (if there were still seats available), and so on. This process continued until there were no seats available in any of the eight high schools.

^{*}This process was implemented beginning with the entering class of September 2003.

LaGuardia High School - Frequently Asked Questions

What is the student required to bring to the audition? (AUD1)

All applicants are to bring the following to each audition: Copies of the previous year's final report card and/or transcript for each studio program Audition ticket (see current school's guidance counselor)

Sharpened pencil Items required by studios (see studio requirements)

Are students admitted solely on the basis of their audition? (AUD2)

No. The audition is only one criterion. Student academic records are also reviewed. Please note: For each audition, every applicant must submit a copy of the previous year's final report card and/or transcript.

How will I know if I have been accepted to LaGuardia Arts? (AUD3)

Students will be officially contacted through their current school's guidance counselor. This generally takes place in February on a date established by the DOE. Your child's current guidance counselor will be able to provide the information when available. Please do not call LaGuardia Arts to inquire about individual results.

May parents accompany their children to the audition? (AUD4)

Yes. Parents may accompany their children to the high school but cannot observe the actual audition. There is limited waiting area for parents. It is recommended that parents plan an activity in the area because the audition process requires approximately 3 hours.

How long will the audition last? (AUD5)

Each audition takes approximately 3 hours to complete. If possible, students should arrange to call a phone number informing the parents that the audition is complete.

May students audition for more than one studio major? (AUD6)

Yes. Students may audition for more than one studio. We recommend that the student bring a lunch if planning two auditions in one day. A student applying to more than two studios must audition on two separate days because a maximum of two auditions may be taken any one day.

If a student in not accepted in the 8th grade, can the audition be taken again in the 9th grade? (AUD7)

Yes. We do admit students in the 10th grade, but fewer openings are available. It is not possible to apply for admission into the 11th or 12th grades. Please note: There is no February admission.

Acceptance to LaGuardia Arts is based on a competitive audition and review of student records to ensure success in both the demanding studio work and the 'challenging academic programs. Students who are New York City residents in the 8th or 9th grade are eligible to audition. In September of the 8th or 9th grade, your child should inform his/her guidance counselor of his/her decision so that an admission ticket can be issued for the appropriate audition(s).

An Open House is held for accepted students each March, prior to the Specialized High School acceptance deadline. Many of our performances are open to the public, and people get a feel of the school by visiting our performance spaces.

Students may audition for the following studios: Art, Dance, Drama, Instrumental Music, Technical Theatre, and/or Vocal Music.

Students come from all five boroughs and reflect the diverse racial and cultural composition of New York City. Our Application and Audition Process is organized into three sections:

Audition Process

Auditions require preparation. In the APPLY section, please review specific studio Requirements and FAQs.

Audition Schedule

Dates are scheduled according to the borough in which your school is located, not where you live, and by the first letter of the student's last name. All Audition ending times are approximate and vary according to the Studio.

Audition: These programs rank students based on their performance in an audition that evaluates how strong they are in a specific performing arts and/or visual arts area. Audition requirements, dates, and times are included on the school pages. Some Audition programs may also consider students' academic performance and attendance from the prior school year.

Educational Option (Ed. Opt.): Educational Option programs are meant to serve students having a wide range of academic levels. These programs admit students who have high, middle, and low reading levels. Half of the students in each reading level group will be selected based on their rankings from the school using multiple criteria. The other half will be selected randomly from the remaining applicants.

Limited Unscreened: Limited Unscreened programs give priority to students who demonstrate interest in the school by attending a school's information session(s), open house event(s), or by visiting the school's table at any one of the High School Fairs. You must sign in at these events to receive priority to the school's Limited Unscreened program(s). Within priority groups, students are randomly selected.

Screened: These programs rank students based on criteria that may include final report card grades, ELA and math standardized test scores, and attendance and punctuality from the prior school year. Each Screened program may also list additional requirements that are considered, such as an interview, essay, on-site exam, or demonstrated interest in the school (such as attendance at an Open House or other school visit) in the selection criteria section of the directory.

Screened: Language: These programs provide services for students with a minimum level of English language acquisition. Admission is based on a student's level of knowledge of the English language and, in some cases, on home language. English Language Learners have priority for these programs.

Screened: Language & Academics: Programs listed as Screened: Language & Academics are similar to Screened: Language programs but also review final report card grades and standardized test scores.

Test: Test programs require students to take the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test (SHSAT) for entrance. Eight of the Specialized High Schools are the only schools that require the SHSAT. For more information, please review the Specialized High Schools Student Handbook or see Section 1.3 "How Do I Register for the Specialized High Schools Admissions Test or LaGuardia High School Auditions?"

Unscreened: Students who apply to Unscreened programs are randomly selected from the entire applicant pool.

Zoned: Zoned programs admit students who live in a geographically designated area. To determine if you are zoned to a high school, enter your address in the School Search tool at nyc.gov/schools/SchoolSearch or call 311. There are two types of zoned programs:

This means that priority group 1 is all continuing eighth graders that listed S34A (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) on their application. These students will be considered before priority group 2, which is all Bronx students or residents who listed this program on their application. This also tells us that 60% of offers during the previous year went to continuing eighth graders.

Here are common Admissions Priorities used to determine offers.

What is in the directory	What it means
"Priority to continuing 8th graders"	Continuing Eighth Graders Priority: This is for students that are at a 6-12 or K-12 school. Continuing eighth grade students are in the first priority group for the high school and are guaranteed to match if they do not match to anything ranked higher on their application. Check your application to see if you have a continuing school.
"Priority to Bronx students or residents" or "Priority to District 32 students or residents"	Geographic Priority: Students may have priority based on the district, borough, or geographic area in which they live and/ or go to school. If a student lives and goes to school in different boroughs or districts, that student has priority in both places.
"Priority to New York City residents who attend an information session"	Limited Unscreened Priority: Students who signed in at a program's open house or at the school's table at a fair are moved to a higher priority group. This happens with programs that use a Limited Unscreened Admissions Method.
"Priority to students who apply and live in the zoned area"	Zoned Priority: Students who live in a certain area will have priority. To find out if you live in a zoned area, check your application or visit schools.nyc.gov/SchoolSearch.

3.2 Eligibility

Some programs are only open to certain students. You must meet the eligibility requirements in order to apply. Eligibility requirements might be based on where you live, your gender, your home language, or other factors. Eligibility requirements are listed in the "Program Admission" section for each program and also underneath the school overview.

- With warm weather upon us, it is important for students to remember that the last
 marking period counts in terms of final grades, which will be used in consideration for
 acceptance to high school. Keep the focus on maintaining high academic standards right
 up until the end of the year. In addition, please remember that attendance and lateness
 are counted through June.
- 2. For those students interested in auditioning at performing arts schools, it is a good idea to get a jump start on preparing for these auditions. - 4. Keep copies of final 7th grade report cards you will need to submit these to many of the schools to which you apply.
- 5. Anyone who plans to apply to Beacon should keep copies of research projects or reports which have teacher comments and grades to submit along with the portfolio which is a requirement for admission (see the Beacon web site for additional information.)
- 6. Students who are interested in art programs should collect and keep work that they might want to include in their art portfolios which are presented at auditions.
- 7. If you have not already done so, please sign up to receive the PTA ListServe btwms54pta-subscribe@yahoogroups.com. Send a blank email, Yahoo will send a reply. You reply back and you should be on. Much high school information will be distributed this way in addition to being sent home in back packs.

As we approach the upcoming high school applications season, there is some important information we would like to share with you. The following schools require more than just putting their names on the high school application, and will not accept any students unless these requirements are completed:

LaGuardia, Frank Sinatra, Art and Design, HS of Fashion Industries, Gramercy Arts, Talent Unlimited, Professional Performing Arts, Special Music School – all require auditions. Audition requirements are listed on schools' web sites

Stuyvesant, Bronx Science, Brooklyn Tech, High School for Math, Science and Engineering at City College, High School of American Studies at Lehman College, Queens High School for the Sciences at York College, Brooklyn Latin, and Staten Island Tech – all require students to take the SHSAT which is given on the last weekend in October or the first weekend in November.

Beacon – Each student must sign up for an interview and submit a portfolio. The interview sign-up is usually on-line at the beginning of October and all information about the portfolio is available at the Beacon web site – www.beaconschool.org.

Bard High School Early College – Requires all applicants to register on line for an assessment. Registration usually begins during September and we will let you know as soon as it becomes available on line – www.bard.edu/bhsec. There are two Bards – one in Manhattan and another in Queens. One assessment may be used for both schools.

Columbia Secondary School - Requires a separate application and interview.

Frank McCourt - On-line essay application required, and possibly an interview as well.

Manhattan/Hunter Science High School – There is an additional application required which may include an essay.

NEST+M (New Explorations into Science, Technology and Math High School) – Interested candidates must take their school-based qualifying exam. See web site for exam dates and to register: www.nestmk12.net.

NYCiSchool – Students must complete an on-line admissions activity (dates during which the activity is available on line will be posted at www.nycischool.org.

Manhattan Village Academy - Students must complete an on-line "intent to apply" form.

HIGH SCHOOL INTERVIEWING TIPS

- 1. Arrive on time and try to relax. Figure out how long it will take to get to the school before the day of the test."
- 2. Be yourself, and try to act naturally and think of it like a friendly conversation. Your interviewer will want to get to know you.
- 3. Sell yourself. Mention things that you do outside of school and share what you are passionate about. It's fine to talk about your extracurricular activities, church involvement, responsibilities at home or anything else you do with your time.
- 4. Be aware of your verbal and nonverbal communication. People can usually tell whether or not you really want to be there so make eye contact and smile. Try to avoid answering questions with "yes" or "no." It is much more helpful to explain "how" and "why."
- 5. Be able to explain why you want to attend, including two or three things that make the school unique and a good fit for you.
- 6. You should be prepared to ask at least one question. Try to ask questions about specific programs, etc., but try not to ask questions that can be easily answered by checking the school's website.
- 7. Dress appropriately. You do not need to get dressed up, but you should look neat and well put-together.

- 1. Why do you want to attend the school?
- 2. How would your family and friends describe you?
- 3. What are your long term goals and dreams?
- 4. What are you most proud of?
- 5. Whom do you admire?
- 6. What is your favorite academic subject, and why?
- 7. What do you like to read, and why?
- 8. What is your favorite extracurricular activity?
- 9. What do you do for fun?

HIGH SCHOOL RECOMMENDATIONS

In order to make the recommendation process as clear as possible, please follow the guidelines below:

- A. Students must ask their teachers in person for letters of recommendation.
- B. All recommendations forms must be held together in a large envelope or paper clip. Loose papers can (and often do) get lost.
- C. All applications must have the due date, student's name and 8th grade homeroom attached to the top of each recommendation form.
- D. Please make sure that the student information section on the top of the recommendation form(s) is filled out (name, date, middle school, etc.)
- E. Envelopes which have the name and address of the school to which the recommendation is to be mailed must be provided for each recommendation. In addition, each envelope must have a postage stamp affixed. Teachers do not give recommendations to students to forward to receiving schools—recommendations are confidential.
- F. All private school recommendation forms must be handed in at least two weeks before the due date, and all private school recommendation forms that are due in January must be handed to teachers by Thanksgiving at the latest!!
